

How to Think Through the Decision to Go to Culinary School

A guide for advancing in or switching to the culinary field

"Should I go back to school?"

It's a common question. In this guide, we outline a step-by-step plan to help you decide if going to a culinary or pastry arts school makes sense for you.

1. Understand Your Motives

Why are you considering going to culinary or pastry school? Rank the following factors to gain a little more clarity on your motivations.

2. Financing: How Will You Pay for Culinary or Pastry Arts School?

How much would you be willing to pay for school out of pocket? How much would you be comfortable borrowing? Evaluate your existing resources and whether or not you plan to continue working while in school.

As a first step, evaluate your **existing resources** such as monthly income and savings. What amount of your annual income and savings would you be willing to allocate towards your educational expenses?

3. Research Programs of Interest

Do you want to study Culinary Arts or Pastry Arts? Will you aim for a diploma or degree?

- What are your family and other obligations to keep in mind? How will you balance those?What will

- Can you meet the required study schedule?

School considerations:

- Is the institution accredited?
- Who are the faculty? What is their work experience and credentials?
- Have you seen the curriculum? Does the school teach things you want to learn? If you need
- flexibility, does the school offer 100% online programs with industry externships?

Logistical considerations:

- Do you meet the basic requirements, like having a high school diploma or GED?
- Can you meet the upcoming deadline for application?
